### **SUMMARY**

At Mount St Joseph, we are rooted in the Gospel values and inspired by our mission to be a community of learners, believers, and friends, our annual plan for prayer and liturgy is designed to nurture the spiritual life of our school. Through regular opportunities for worship, reflection, and celebration, we seek to deepen our shared faith, promote a sense of belonging, and support the spiritual growth of every member of our community. This plan ensures that the rhythms of Catholic life are embedded in our daily experiences, fostering a living faith that shapes who we are and how we serve others.

### INTRODUCTION

This annual plan outlines the provision of prayer and liturgy. It sets out the rhythms of daily, weekly, and seasonal worship that shape the spiritual life of our school, ensuring that prayer and liturgy are meaningful, inclusive, and rooted in the liturgical calendar. The plan details key opportunities for collective worship throughout the Church year, including major feasts, liturgical seasons, and moments of reflection that support the formation of our students and staff in faith.

In addition, this document outlines a clear structure for the progression of liturgical understanding and participation across all year groups, along with a framework for ongoing evaluation to ensure our worship remains dynamic, purposeful, and responsive to the needs of our community.

This rhythm follows the liturgical calendar of the Catholic Church, marking key seasons and celebrations such as Advent, Lent, and Easter. It includes a diverse range of worship forms, from traditional prayers and liturgies to modern expressions of faith that engage students in creative and reflective ways. Whether through whole-school Masses, class-based worship, or moments of quiet reflection, prayer at Mount St Joseph supports the spiritual development of each student and reflects our commitment to living out Gospel values in daily life.

### **DAILY PROVISION**

### PDT COLLECTIVE WORSHIP

Each morning our school day begins with a time of collective worship, these are provided to PDT teachers each week based on themes from the liturgical calendar following the weekly Gospel reading. Each week's worship contains a number of different styles of worship including; silence, music, responsive prayers, traditional prayers and symbolic actions Alll worship at MSJ follows a four part structure of; gather, listen, respond and go forth. This structure mimics the structure of the Mass and allows students to more fully participate in the collective worship.

### PRAYER SPACE IN THE CHAPEL

The chapel is available each day for students wishing to spend any time in prayer or reflection during break and dinner times. Throughout the year different creative prayer stations will be set up, with the help of the GIFT team, that allow students to actively worship and follow themes through the liturgical year.

### **PRAYERS ON SOCIAL MEDIA**

To ensure that we involve our wider community in the collective worship that we participate in, all of our daily worship is publicly shared both on the school website and also on X.



### **WEEKLY PROVISION**

### **HOUSE ASSEMBLY**

House Assemblies bring together students and staff from across year groups within their house family. They are a time to celebrate achievements, reflect on shared values, and strengthen the bonds that make MSJ a true community. Rooted in the Catholic tradition of unity and service, these assemblies encourage students to live out their faith through teamwork, kindness, and compassion. As learners, we celebrate growth; as believers, we recognise God's presence in one another; and as friends, we build a supportive, caring community.

### YEAR GROUP ASSEMBLY

Year group assemblies are mainly used to share important updates and notices about our school community, but alongside this one they are also an opportunity to celebrate successes of our community and pray together. Each PDT group has an opportunity to plan and deliver their own assembly which reflects on our Gospel values, these assemblies provide an opportunity for student planned and led worship for their peers.

### STAFF BRIEFING

Each week as staff we begin our briefing in prayer, these prayers are led by staff from all departments across the school who are give the freedom to lead a time of worship following the weekly Gospel reading and themes provided by the diocese. It's an opportunity for staff to pause, invite God into their work, and remember the mission of Catholic education — to teach with love and lead with faith.

### **FRIDAY REFLECTION**

Just as each week begins with a time of reflection for staff, every Friday there is an opportunity for staff to gather together in the Chapel to pray and worship together. These reflection look at the daily readings or current events in the school and world and provide a close to the week in prayer and reflection.

### **WEEKLY PROVISION**

### PDT CHAPEL WORSHIP

Every PDT group throughout the year has an opportunity to spend their morning PDT lesson in the chapel for an extended collective worship. PDT (Personal Development Time) Chapel Worship gives small groups the opportunity to gather in a sacred space for prayer and reflection. It allows students to deepen their relationship with God and one another in a quiet, personal way. Guided by Scripture, prayer, and discussion, this worship helps everyone grow as learners who seek understanding, believers who live out their faith, and friends who care for one another as members of God's family.



### **TERMLY PROVISION**

### YEAR GROUP MASS

Throughout the year each year group is provided the opportunity to celebrate Mass, the source and summit of the Catholic faith together. Year 7's have the opportunity to celebrate the welcome mass to begin their time at MSJ. Year 8 and 10 celebrate Mass in the lead up to Christmas and Y9 celebrate Mass in the lead up to Easter. Year 11's have the opportunity to celebrate their leaver's Mass, drawing an end to their journey with us in our community of learners, believers and friends.

### **VOLUNTARY MASS**

To provide a more regular opportunity for students and staff wishing to celebrate Mass together as a community, each term an additional Mass is celebrated in the Chapel for any person in the school community wishing to attend.

### SACRAMENTAL PROVISION

As a Catholic community we ensure that alongside the celebration of Eucharist we also provide an opportunity for members of our community to receive other Sacraments as part of their Journey at MSJ. During Advent and Lent we offer a service of Reconciliation for any members of our community wishing to attend. Alongside this during Lent, we run Confirmation preparation classes in conjunction with our local parish

Advent is a season of preparation and anticipation for the celebration of Jesus' birth. We aim to create a peaceful and reflective atmosphere throughout the school to encourage students to enter into the spirit of waiting and hope.

### Classroom and School Environment

- Advent wreaths in hall spaces, with weekly candle lighting.
- Purple and pink liturgical colours used in displays and fabrics.
- Nativity scenes placed in dining hall
- Advent/Christmas displays with scripture, prayers, student artwork, and key themes (Hope, Peace, Joy, Love) in the Chapel.

### **Prayer and Liturgy**

- Morning prayers themed around Advent (Hope, Peace, Joy, Love).
- Staff briefings/opening prayers focused around the advent wreath
- Reconciliation offered to community

### **Overall Tone**

### Atmosphere

- Emphasis on waiting in hope (Advent), not rushing to Christmas.
- Joyful but prayerful tone balance between festive cheer and spiritual reflection.

- Encourage stillness and reflection amid busy school life.

Ordinary Time is the longest liturgical season, offering us a time for growth and deepening our faith. We celebrate the ongoing presence of Christ in our lives and strive to live out the Gospel message in our daily actions.

- Scripture verses on growth, discipleship, and mission (e.g., parables, Sermon on the Mount).
- Student work and RE projects linked to living out faith in daily life.
- Prayer stations including saints' feast days and Catholic Social Teaching themes in the chapel.

### **Prayer and Liturgy**

- Daily Prayer rooted in Gospel readings of the day, with focus on discipleship and growth in faith.
- Student-written intentions to reflect the ordinariness of daily life with God.
- Marking key feast days and solemnities within Ordinary Time (e.g., Corpus Christi, Sacred Heart, Saints Peter & Paul).
- House assemblies and PDT chapel worship on rotation, with messages themed on Ordinary Time.
- Prayer services themed around creation, stewardship, or vocation.

### **Overall Tone**

- Emphasis on steady growth and living discipleship faith in the everyday, not just during major feasts.
- A spirit of "ordinary holiness" finding God in work, study, friendship, and service.
- Reflective, consistent rhythm to the school's spiritual life.
- Encourage inclusivity, showing how "ordinary time" relates to all students' journeys.

# **INCLUSIVE PRACTICE**

The Prayer and Liturgy Directory for Catholic Schools (2023) emphasises that prayer and worship are at the heart of Catholic education. It also stresses the need for these practices to be inclusive, accessible, and invitational, ensuring that all students and staff — Catholic and non-Catholic — can participate meaningfully.

### **ROOTED IN CATHOLIC IDENTITY, OPEN TO ALL**

All prayer and worship is authentically Catholic in content (Scripture, liturgy, sacraments, traditions). At the same time, it is invitational rather than imposed — pupils of other faiths or no faith are welcomed to take part respectfully, without pressure to profess belief. Practices are explained clearly so all understand the meaning, not just "what to do."

### **ACCESIBLE LANGUAGE AND SYMBOLISM**

Use of clear, simple, and age-appropriate language in prayers, so students from different backgrounds can understand. Symbols (candles, water, light, music, silence) are chosen with care — universal in appeal while retaining Catholic depth. Scripture passages are introduced with context to help all students connect.

### **VARIED FORMS OF PRAYER**

MSJ encourages a range of prayer experiences so every student can encounter God in different ways This variety ensures inclusivity — different personalities and faith backgrounds can engage meaningfully:

- Formal liturgical prayer (Mass, Liturgy of the Word, Stations of the Cross).
- Traditional Catholic prayer (Our Father, Hail Mary, Rosary, Examen).
- Creative and student-led prayer (drama, art, poetry, silence, spontaneous prayer).
- Contemplative prayer (stillness, meditation, Lectio Divina).

### STUDENT LEADERSHIP AND PARTICIPATION

Pupils are encouraged to plan, lead, and participate in acts of worship. Leadership roles (readers, musicians, drama, prayer writing) allow students of different abilities and backgrounds to contribute. Student involvement fosters ownership and ensures prayer is not just "done to them" but "done with them."

# OTHER FAITHS

### **AUTHENTIC CATHOLIC WORSHIP**

All prayer and liturgy is rooted in Catholic faith: Scripture, sacraments, Church teaching, liturgical year. Non-Catholic pupils are not asked to compromise their own beliefs but are invited to share in the spiritual life of the school through respectful participation. When referencing other religious festivals (e.g., Ramadan, Diwali), these are acknowledged respectfully in assemblies while keeping Christ at the centre of worship.

### **INVITATIONAL, NOT IMPOSED**

Participation is always by invitation, never coercion. Pupils may join in Catholic prayers and gestures if they wish, but if not, they can participate by adopting a posture of reverence and reflection. Language used in worship avoids assuming all pupils are Catholic, instead inviting everyone into a shared moment of prayer, reflection, or silence.

### SHARED VALUES AND CATHOLIC SOCIAL TEACHING

Many values in Catholic Social Teaching (human dignity, solidarity, care for creation) resonate across faith traditions. School prayer and worship can highlight these values, providing a meeting point for pupils of different beliefs.

### OPPORTUNITIES TO LIVE OUT THEIR FAITH

Students of other faiths are encouraged and supported in living out their own beliefs with dignity and respect. Opportunities may include space and time for personal prayer, recognition of significant religious festivals, and encouragement to share their traditions in appropriate ways within the life of the school. This not only honours their faith identity but also deepens the whole community's understanding of religious diversity, while remaining rooted in the Catholic mission of respect, dialogue, and the search for truth.



# **SKILL STRATEGY**

A document such as this, which makes clear how young people grow and progress in prayer and liturgy, can help clarify the journey young people and staff will make as part of the community. Regularly reviewing the progression map can then help ensure that a spirit of growth and formation is continually fostered to ensure that prayer and liturgy remain engaging and accessible to all.
